Out Door Cooking

Campfire Meatloaf

This recipe is great because you do not need any cookware. The onion is your baking dish and adds flavor to the meat

Large onion for each camper 1 lb. Ground beef 1 egg 1/4 cup milk Season with salt and pepper 2 slices bread, crumbled Tin foil



Prepare meatloaf before hand or bring along a bowl or bag to mix together at the campsite. Cut out center of onion or cut onion in half and scoop middle out. Place meatloaf mixture in each onion and wrap in tin foil. Cook in coals 15-20 minutes and flip over once.

Fun and Easy Science Experiment.

Is this Egg Raw or Boiled???

Surprise your friends and family with an easy science experiment that answers a tricky question. Two eggs look and feel the same but there is a big difference, one is raw and the other hard boiled, find out which is which with this fun experiment.

Supplies:

One raw egg - (both eggs should be refrigerated so that they are the same temperature)

One hard boiled egg


Smooth Surface

Instructions:

Spin the eggs and watch what happens, one egg should spin while the other wobbles. You can also lightly touch each of the eggs while they are spinning, one should stop quickly while the other keeps moving after you have touched it.

What is happening?

The raw egg's center of gravity changes as the white and yolk move around inside the shell, causing the wobbling motion. Even after you touch the shell it continues moving. This is because of inertia, the same_type of force you feel when you change direction or stop suddenly in a car, your body wants to move one way while the car wants to do something different. Inertia causes the raw egg to spin even after you have stopped it, this contrasts with the solid white and yolk of the hard boiled egg, it responds much quicker if you touch it.
